Presenter Bios

Health Leads & Bay Area Health Justice Collective

Virginia Hall is a Peer Specialist graduate, advocate, and pioneer who brings over 30+ years of experience providing in depth commitment to the consumer movement. Engaging and supporting individuals in finding a voice led her to the State's Capitol on several occasions to represent her community. Virginia continues to reach her goals using her professional talents and skills to promote systemic change as well as direct service to her community. She is a Community Health Advocate for Lifelong Medical's H2H Program for the City of Berkeley in the State of California; Steering Committee Vice-Chair for the Alameda County Behavior Health Pool of Consumer Champions, and staff to POCC's Public Policy and Education Committee. Her trips to the States Capitol, City Council Meetings and to the County Board of Supervisors forums have resulted in changes in legislation in Welfare Reform, Peer Specialist Bills, and Tenant & Housing Rights in her city, county and state. An additional accomplishment she hails is being a certified vocational nursing graduate where she has displayed integrity, respect, and compassion for everyone she has encountered. While Virginia's advocacy in civic community engagement has led her to engage effectively in state-wide alliances, she continues to take a stand with a common goal of supporting equity and health in underserved communities.

Lauren Pennachio is the Director of Revenue Strategy and Partnerships at Health Leads, an organization that runs local and national projects that unearth and address the roots of racial inequity that impact our health. Based in the Bay Area, Lauren leads housing-focused efforts as a means to improve community health and works across

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diverse partners to ensure innovative, community-anchored strategies become sustainably funded. Leveraging Human Centered Design a tool to re-design the social safety net to drive towards health equity, Lauren's work focuses on bringing together the stakeholders necessary to improve community health to make community-anchored decisions and drive community-level impact. Her systems level approach can in part be attributed to her degrees in Cellular and Molecular Neuroscience and Biology from The Johns Hopkins University.

Reinvent South Stockton Coalition

Darryl Rutherford earned a B.A. in social and behavioral sciences from CSU Monterey Bay and a M.S. in community development from the University of California at Davis. He has worked for the Community Services Planning Council, California Coalition for Rural Housing, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, and ED for the Sacramento Housing Alliance. In 2018, Rutherford became ED of the Reinvent South Stockton Coalition, a collective impact movement which aims to empower residents to transform their community. Darryl lives in the Sacramento Region with his beautiful wife and two teenage daughters who enjoy camping, sporting activities, and vegging out together.

Jessica Praphath is the third of four children, raised in Stockton, CA by her mother who is a Thai refugee and her father who is a Lao refugee. Jessica was the first in her family to graduate from high school, the first to graduate from college, and the first to graduate with her Masters. She earned a B.A. from UC Berkeley and her MBA and MPH from Boston University. After graduating from college in 2013, Jessica returned home where she began her career as a community organizer. She worked at a family resource center; then at a federally qualified health center supporting the roll out of Covered California outreach and enrollment efforts; and with a few close friends and mentors, started a collective impact initiative which later became the Reinvent South Stockton Coalition. While getting her MBA and MPH, Jessica worked at John Snow Inc. on health systems transformation initiatives which focused on integrated delivery systems and social determinants of health. She is currently a Director at Third Sector, a non-profit consulting organization that supports state and local governments to maximize the impact of social programs. Jessica lives in Oakland, CA with her dog and they frequently visit Stockton where all of their family still lives.

Bilal Taylor, MPA, has spent 20 years developing, implementing and evaluating the efficacy of programmatic and systems-level interventions that enhance the quality of life


